Feedback Obtained

The College is constantly in dialogue with all its stake holders and seeks advice and input from industry leaders, in order to provide value in the many areas of engagement. 360 degree structured feedback is obtained in different forms from students from all programs offered in two different platforms Exit interviews of the outgoing final year students and Open House a closed door IQAConlyplatform where students are free to walk in and engage in open dialogues with IQAC Coordinator on any issues topics concerns of the student community. Parents feedback of undergraduate students' performance are obtained once a year in the parent's teacher association meeting. The placement department undertakes the obtainment of the feedback from the corporateindustry partners of their view of the students placed with them. The faculty feedback obtained from the students are collated and forwarded to the principal. He gives constructive review of the feedback to each staff member personally. The College obtains student feedback twice in an academic year at the end of the semester. The data generated from these various feedback platforms are compiled by the IQAC office and the action taken report is shared with the concerned stakeholder including the program heads, viceprincipals, and principals. The following are some of the action taken based on the staff evaluation • Subject Allocation • Shared Teaching • Counselling for teachers • Training session to improve teacher efficiency. • FDP on current and relevant topics. • Course feedbacks The coursesyllabus updation, revamp and corrections are initiated in the agenda for deliberation in the Total Quality Management meeting (TQM), based on the information obtained from the focussed feedbacks systems available in the college. In addition to the above interventions, each faculty member offering a core/elective course compulsorily engages with an industry practitioner, external academic peers and gathers feedback on course content. Based on the faculty's experience in conducting the course, a proposed set of actions in terms of skill developments, course specific student activities, changes and deletions of course related concepts are also documented. Feedbacks from internal course/subject experts meeting regarding module delivery, assessments, guest lectures, module preparations, module delivery pedagogy are also incorporated as feedbacks. These feedbacks are documented in the module review document prepared by the faculty at the end of the semester and used as inputs for TQM. TQM deliberations are recorded and incorporated in the module review document which is then presented in the Board of studies (BOS) meeting

held twice in an academic yearone in each semester. The Board of studies comprises of members from internal faculty members, external faculty members of reputed institutions, industry representative, university representative, alumni representative in addition to the subject experts of the college. The resolutions passed in the BOS meeting are analysed and reported to the academic council for necessary changes in the course/syllabus content for the upcoming academic year. This ensures that all the courses are contemporary, relevant fulfilling the future employment requirement of students.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The college understands that holistic, and personality development skills required to mentor students effectively are the need of the hour and has made a provision for counselors, mentors and advisors to take care of this. Teachers are allocated as either Class mentors or ClassinCharge for each class. Fours counselors available for the students in the college with HODS and placement coordinators acting as advisors. There are two teachers assigned for each class Class mentor and ClassInCharge. The students are equally divided between the two teachers. This enables newly enrolled 1st year students to have more mentoring time. From the second year on wards, availing of mentoring services from the counsellors becomes voluntary. Every class mentor is assigned the task of mentoring a class in areas of attendance, performances, concerns, activities involved etc. The Class mentor keep a track of student academic performance to monitor their progress. This helps to track the progress of the student from the initial stage and provide the necessary feedback in an ongoing manner. Class mentors undertake the responsibility to organize visits to NGO's, orphanages, old age homes etc. Parents are also appraised of learner outcomes and corrective measures undertaken by the Institution by the ClassInCharge. Guest Lectures on important social issues are periodically organized by the classincharge Students who have doubts or face difficulties in comprehending academic topics are free to approach the classincharge teachers outside class hours for academic mentoring. The 1st year UG and PG students go through mandatory counselling. The 1st year student's avail more time from their mentors. HRD classes are conducted with the objective of empowering students to develop self confidence and have inter personal skills. Value based topics

are discussed as well as issues faced by youth in modern day urbanized society. Most of the student's activities are linked to a social cause thereby sensitizing students. The mentoring system specifically focus on developing the following matters for the graduating batch of students, the class mentor along with the placement cell ensure that all the students opting for placement activities are present of workshops and training modules arranged by the placement to enable (a) Employ ability Skills of their mentees and record/document academic progression(b)Communications skills(c)Self Confidence and Attitude(d)Adaptability and Flexibility. The mentoring system of the college provides academic guidance, personal counselling and psychosocio guidance in the following manner to the student community. Through Academic guidance: Identification of weak students after midterm exams through their results, Identification through attendance pattern, Voluntary disclosure by students, Eliciting support from teachers help through peer group teaching are ensured. Through personal counselling, each class having allotted with a counsellor, meeting every student, creating awareness, problems areas identifications of the students is possible. Repeat sessions are scheduled to which students come on a voluntary basis. Through psychosocio guidance, by HRD classes. topics of contemporary interest, guest lectures on sensitive topics, screening of socially relevant movies, encouraging social action initiatives are possible.

The college manages its physical infrastructure, academic and support facilities with a team of dedicated staff, specific policies and procedure, grants and funds - GIA, UGC and management funds for all infrastructure development. An expenditure Rs.5,30,86,109 for maintenance of academic and physical infrastructure has been incurred in the current year. The nonteaching administrations staff include full time electricians, gardener, sweepers and security staff. The sports grounds (58,800 sq.ftfootball and 5850sq.ft basketball), gymnasium, TT room and sports equipment are in the care of the sport director supported by 4 staff members. Understanding that empowering people in management results in a more responsive, more flexible and more successful identity, SJCC has bestowed autonomy to its faculty members in many areas of academic and nonacademic domains. Unlocking the faculty member's potential has resulted in people driven growth of the college which is evidently visible in the sustained ranking position that the college has attained in successive all India ranking positions in the India Today ranking of Commerce Colleges of India. Starting from planning the academic calendar of events to the valuation of answer scripts, the college has created a unique ambiance of selfmanagement in the faculties of the college, thereby successfully creating faculty partnerships with the college management. The student council members who are responsible for organizing social and extracurricular events are elected student representatives and are to privy to a range of professional benefits, and exposure to a variety of opportunities beyond curriculum. The coordinator in charge of the certificate programs is fully empowered to take proposals from the staff members of certificate courses. The same is scrutinized for relevance and contemporariness, and given for approval to the Head of the Departments. Once approved, vetted for implementation, the details of the courses are informed to the students in the student Orientation programme by the faculty members. The fee charges and payment to teachers for such courses is also deliberated and finalized.. Human Resource Management

The college takes pride in providing the best working environment and benefits package in the region helping in attracting the best talent. Career progression is supported and clear growth paths for individuals are articulated by the management keeping all most all the posts on a rotational basis. The performance appraisal system of the college elicits the personal attention of the Principal who takes care to personally counsel and guides the staff members. The management and the IQAC regularly devise plans for not only faculty development programs but also employee development programs for administrative and support staff of the college. The management provides staff welfare in various forms viz, fee concessions to staff children in the institution, free lunches to support staff, health insurance to staff members, special leave for Ph.D., Ph.D. defense leaves, paternity leave and special leave consideration for major sickness and ill health. Faculty members attending conferences inside the state, outside the state and aboard are amply refunded the amounts of registration and travel expenses.

Research and Development

Research Center by the Bangalore University was established in the year 2010 in the College. There are eight board members in the research center. The Research Centre, along with the subject teachers, guide and mentor the undergraduate and postgraduate students in research work. Student research in the form of case study and research papers are compiled, edited and published by the college. Center organized two workshops. Both workshops were seven day long. To empower the budding women scholars, the workshop organized in September is exclusively designed for them funded by UGC. The workshop organized in December is the experiential workshop aimed to develop research capabilities among researchers and academicians. This year saw the electronic service of the "SJCC Management Research Review" being launched as a new website for journals into permanent operation. Research Assessment Committee (RAC) Meeting was heldon Friday 29th June 2018. Nineteen Books/Monographs Written/ Books Edited volumes,11 numbers of Publication in

conference -proceedings/ Books and chapters in edited volumes, and 31 paper publications of faculty were recorded in this academic year, along with more than 41 international, national, state and city level seminars and conferences participation by faculty members of the college.

Curriculum Development

For all UG and PG programs, the college has the policy to alter and develop the curriculum once in every five years in general as per Bengaluru University Guidelines. The choicebased credit system (CBCS) was introduced in 201516 across all programs offered by the college. The course matrix under the choice based credit system (CBCS) has been built to ensure that skill development and interdisciplinary courses remain an important part of the program. From 201819, the curriculum follows the OutcomeBased Education (OBE) model. The Program Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes, and Course Outcomes are well defined and communicated to students. But the commerce and management sector being disrupted by constant economic, regulatory changes, acts and amendments, every year detailed feedback is taken through survey from the alumni, the industry expert, subject experts from other institutions in addition to the inhousefaculty of the college. Feedback of the students of the college, too, are collected from the various feedback platforms employed solely for this purpose. The Board of Studies (BOS) collates all this information from all sources and a meeting is set up to finalize the same. The BOS considers all the inputs and finally decides the content of the course and the examination scheme and provides its recommendation to the Academic Council for necessary approval.

Teaching and Learning

The Classroom infrastructure is equipped with LCDs, audiovisual and laptop usage facilities. The college has various academic committees to ensure the usage of appropriate teaching and learning techniques for both UG and PG classes. Bridge Courses at the beginning of the first semester ensure that the learning levels of the students from sciences and noncommerce

disciplines are bridged to enable seamless teaching and learning. Continuous Internal Assessment enables the class mentors to identify slow and advanced learners summoning remedial classes measures wherever deemed necessary. The classroom pedagogy is attuned to cater to both advanced and slow learners. Assignment and tests are framed to include the usage of the library and its resources. The Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) gives the students the freedom to choose the subjects of their choices. Tally, Excel, SPSS, SAP classes taught through hands on learning methods ensure that the students have practical and applicative knowledge of the theories learned in classrooms. Guest Lectures, debates conducted and mediated by eminent industry experts subject experts enable realtime exposure of the corporate world. Industrial visits of both national, international nature assist the students to understand the global, practical operational aspects of corporate life and identify the area of interest for further career opportunities in the industry. The internship is a part of experiential learning not only trains the students in critical thinking and nurture active learning but also acts as a resource of networking for a further future career opportunity.

Examination and Evaluation

The Examination Department has been consistently striving to reform the examination systems. This year again the Examination Department has added a few more qualityenhancing practices namely a) Extensive use of the Learning Management System (LMS) platform for the conduct of Internal Assessments and Mid Term Retests, b) Assessment of learning outcomes as per the OBE framework has been initiated. Each question of the internal and external examination has been linked to the Course Learning Outcomes (CLO) and the students' performance linked to the attainment of the CLO.c) The practice of displaying the best answer scripts for each of the courses has been initiated this year. d) Quick and Transparent, Errorfree evaluation process culminating in the quick declaration of results of the End Semester Exam without compromising on

the quality of assessment continues to be the foundation of the department.e) Audit of exam department: The audit of exam department was conducted on 8th June , 2018. The audit committee comprised of: Dr Lawrence, Pondicherry University and Dr Jerome Xavier, Principal, Indian Academy Degree College (Autonomous). The committee appreciated the working of the examination department and also gave some suggestions that could be implemented in the future. The Department employs objective evaluative methods and maintains transparency in evaluation processes. The performance of our students both at UG and PG level has been outstanding and reflective of the Institution's efforts to deliver academic excellence.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The presence of industry members begins at the highest academic level i.e., the Governing Body of the College. where an industry expert without whose approval new programs cannot be implemented. Their presence in the Board of Studies is pertinent to the development of the curriculum and ensure that it is updated and benefits all the stakeholders of the institution. Guest lectures by industry personnel are a regular feature of the curriculum.On the 18th and 19th of February, 2019, a national seminar was organized for the B.Com Industry Integrated Programme students on the topic '4th Industrial Revolution' where key industry personnel discussed the changing trends in the different sectors. The entrepreneurship students have reaped enormous benefits from interaction with the industry experts. As a result of industry collaboration the college has an incubation centre giving students a space for pitching innovative ideas and working towards executing them. As a pioneering initiative, SJCC has introduced an internship semester for the students of M.Com (Financial Analysis). The six months corporate internship during the 4th semester provides the students with the much required industry exposure and serves as a Launchpad for their career practice. In addition, the College has entered into collaboration with Federation of Karnataka chambers of Commerce Industry (FKCCI) , Karnataka

	Tourism Forum ,Patrick's Academy,Thomas Cook, IMS Proschool,EY, TCS, Miles Education to run and support various programs of the college.
Admission of Students	The Governing Body of St. Joseph's College of Commerce meets twice a year and reviews admission. Irrespective of their background, students are granted admission to SJCC. A diverse crowd including nontraditional learners, firstgeneration students, quick learners, academically challenged students, and students from different linguistic, social and cultural backgrounds are admitted into the college. The admission activities for the year 201819 began during the months of April and May where foundations were laid for the future sports activities of the year by identifying the vacant positions in each team due to the graduation of final year students. A total of 150 students registered for the sports quota admissions in various disciplines and 32 were inducted based on their individual sports merits to strengthen the sports teams for the year 201819. Other students include ones from disadvantaged backgrounds.

6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 – Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly (with in 100 words each)

The college conducts internal and external financial audits annually to monitor the monetary transactions of the college. The internal audits are conducted midacademic year where a team of three professionals conduct the auditing and any discrepancy is brought to the notice of the Principal immediately. The management of the college is also capable of drawing the Principal's attention to any important matter. The external audits entail the auditing of all the different units of the management. The observations made by them are regularly complied with. The government also sends auditors to the college and their queries are attended to as well. The college has a stringent system in the management of the financial transactions. The line of control is traced from the Finance officer to the Head Office Accountant. Any problems are immediately addressed by the finance officer in consultation with the principal and with the help of the Accountant who consults the matter with Head Office Accountant. The college has always avoided cash transactions to make it the affair transparent. Internal audit from BJES.Financial administration - management communicates to the units budget consultations - compare previous academic year expenses and draw the budget for the present year - budget is presented to governing board of managementonce board approves it is sent to the president for approval - president with certain comments will approve and incorporating the feedback budget is finalized . Any collection in the institution will go the collection account for which principal is not the authorized signatory. In the institution the finance officer in consultation with the principal executes the budget - management follows a centralized accounting system and the principal is not the authorized signatory sanctions - finance officer is the authorized person. Finance officer in consultation with the principal prepares the monthly budget and management will sanction what is required for the month according to the overall budget approved. Account settlement needs to happen on a monthly basis and it is mandatory to get the next month's budget approved. The management constitutes a threemember team to do the internal audit and their main task is to check the complied suggestions given by the auditors and management. Whether the college is complying with statutory norms like deduction of TDS, whether sanctioned amount is paid as salary, scrutinize assets registry of the institution. The team submits a confidential report to the president of the society. Suggestions given by the auditorsAmounts to be credited as per the heads prescribed by the auditor - if the auditor brings to our notice any discrepancy or audit objections it will be immediately rectified
